College is not a commodity. Stop Treating it like one.

“To create what is, for most of us, that “new sensation,” you need a professor who provokes and a student who stops slumbering. It is the responsibility of colleges and universities to **place students in environments that provide these opportunities**. It is the responsibility of students to seize them. Genuine education is not a commodity, it is the awakening of a human being”.

Why have students collaborate?

Group projects can help students develop a host of skills that are increasingly important in the professional world (Caruso & Woolley, 2008; Mannix & Neale, 2005). Positive group experiences, moreover, have been shown to contribute to student learning, retention and overall college success (Astin, 1997; Tinto, 1998; National Survey of Student Engagement, 2006).

- * Break complex tasks into parts and steps
- * Refine understanding through discussion and explanation
- * Give and receive feedback on performance
- * Develop stronger communication skills.
- * Delegate roles and responsibilities.
- * Share diverse perspectives.
- * Hold one another (and be held) accountable.
- * Receive social support and encouragement to take risks.
- * Develop new approaches to resolving differences.
- * Find effective peers to emulate.
- * Develop their own voice and perspectives in relation to peers.

What are the challenges of group work?

For students, common challenges of group work include:

- * Coordination costs (time and energy)
- * Motivation costs (free riding, social loafing, conflicts)
- * Intellectual costs (group think, information effect)

For instructors, common challenges involve:

- * Allocating time
- * Teaching process skills
- * Assessing process as well as product
- * Assessing individual as well as group learning

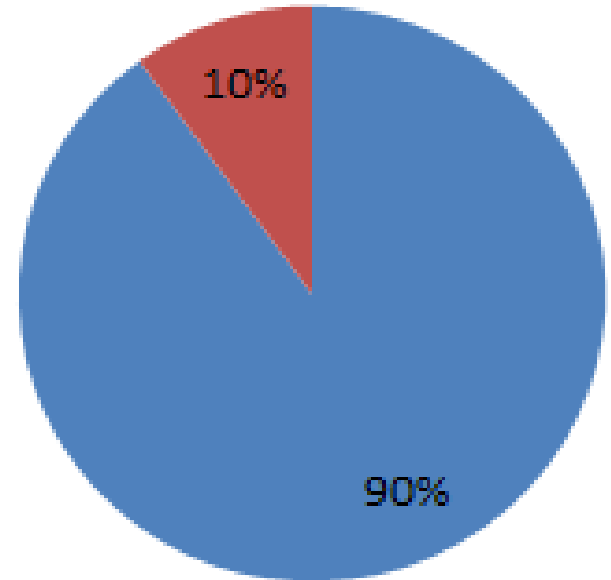

1. We spend about 3 billion hours a week playing video and computer games as a planet?

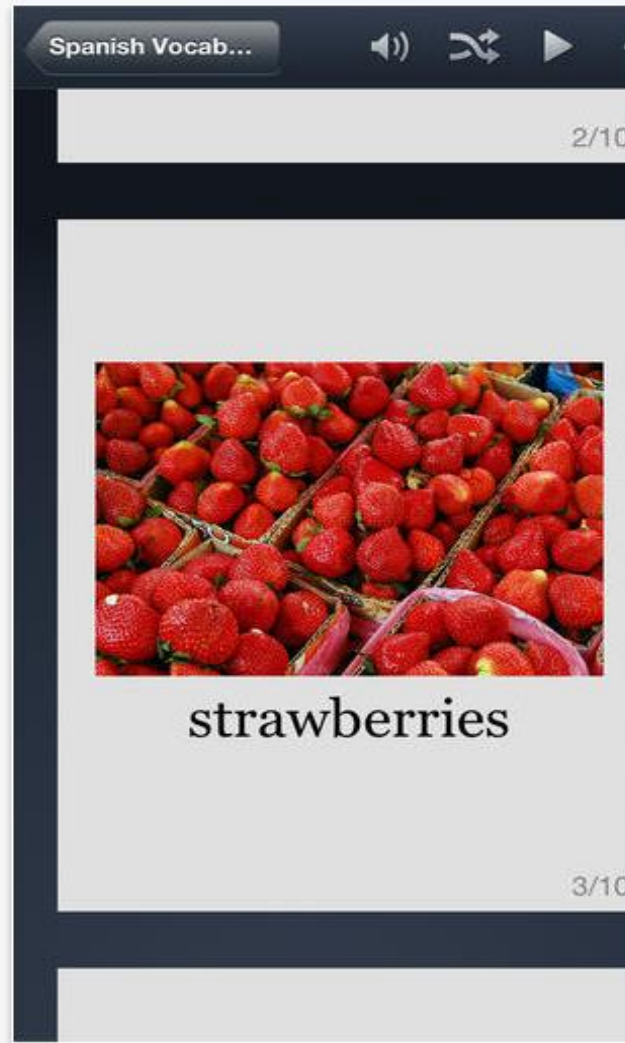

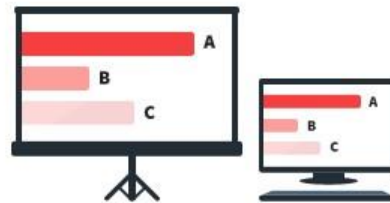

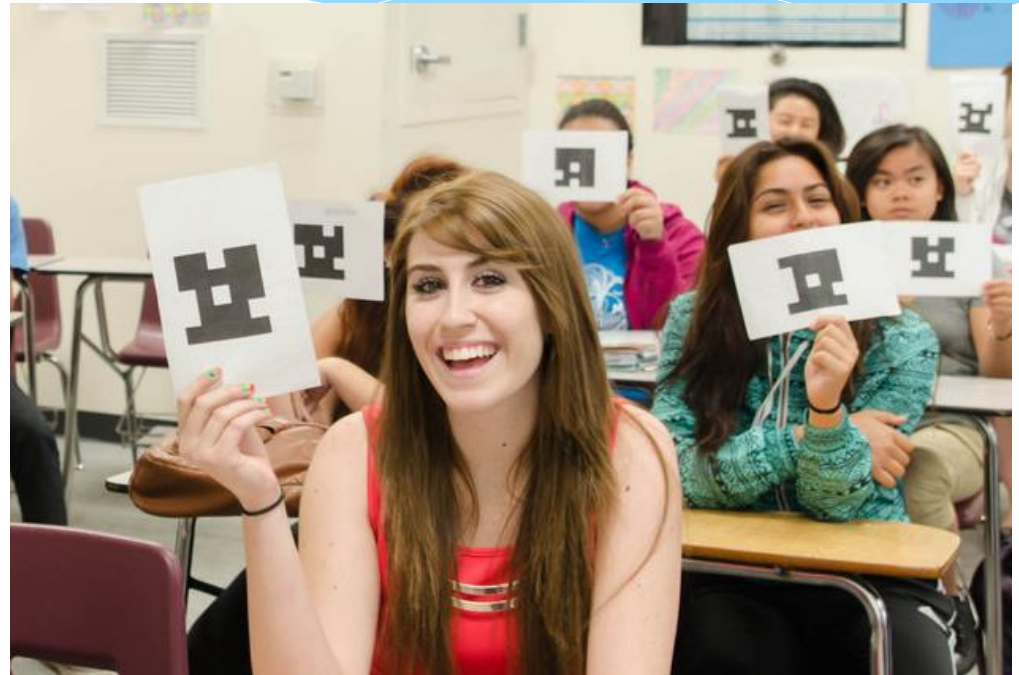

Give all students the chance to participate and engage in learning without feeling self-conscious.

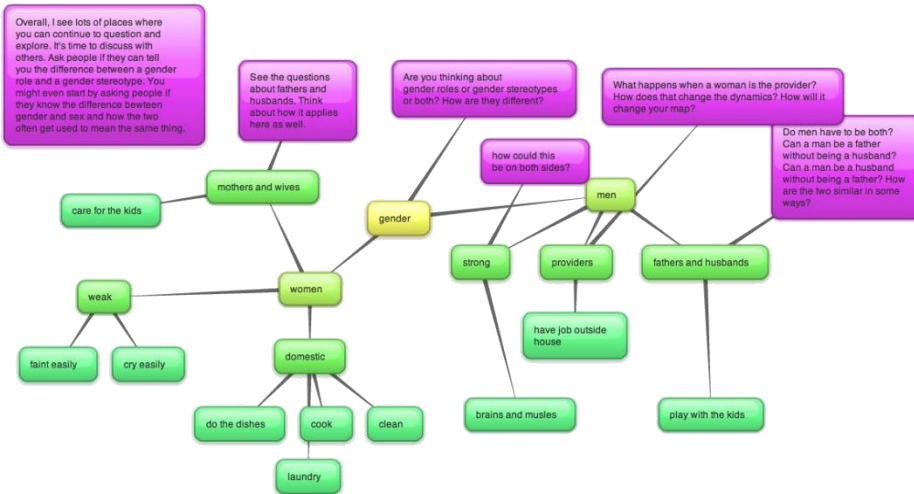

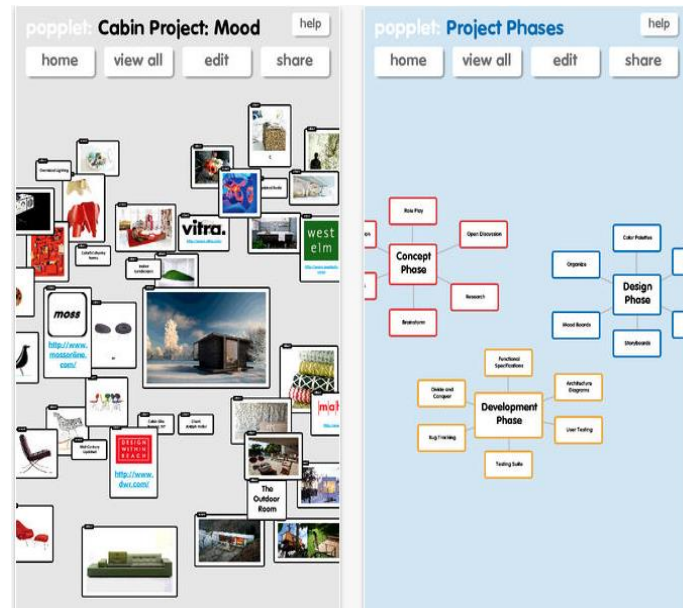

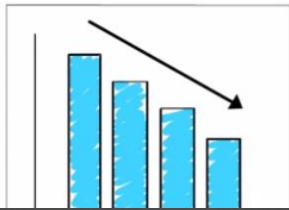


What style of leadership should you use?

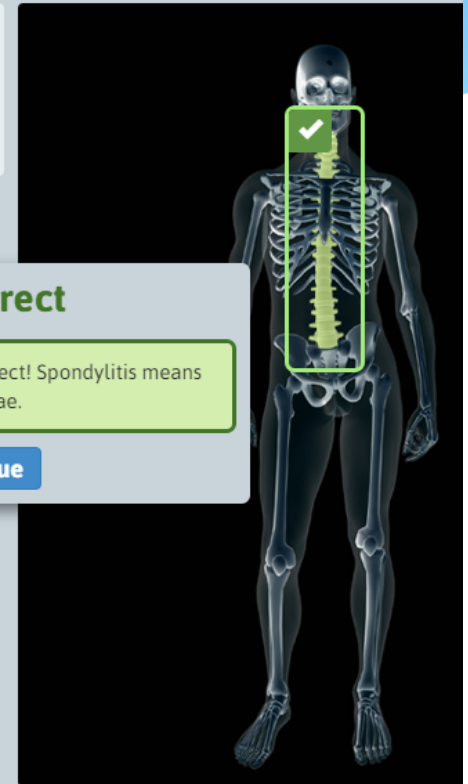

HISTORY OF PRESENT ILLNESS: Patient is an 86-year-old Caucasian female who presents with complaint of low back pain for the past month. She states pain is increasingly affecting her active lifestyle.
