KEYNOTE SPEAKERS

Dr. John O'Brien



The History of the Future of Educational Technology

Dr. John O'Brien serves as the president and CEO of EDUCAUSE, a nonprofit association whose mission is to advance higher

education through the use of information technology. Throughout his 25-year career in higher education, John has deeply engaged with the IT and educational technology sectors. Most recently, John served as senior vice chancellor for academic and student affairs at Minnesota State Colleges and Universities (MnSCU), the fourth largest higher education system in the country. In this position, John was dedicated to ensuring student success and implemented strategic changes to help MnSCU adapt to the changing needs of higher education. Prior to this role, John served as president of North Hennepin Community College (NHCC) from 2010 to 2013. Before joining NHCC, he was director of MnSCU's "Students First" initiative, a systemwide effort that redesigned online systems to better meet students' needs related to searching for a college or university, program or course, as well as applying for admission, registering for courses, and viewing or paying tuition bills. John's past experience also includes four years at Century College serving as chief academic officer and subsequently as acting president. John also served as associate vice chancellor of instructional technology at the MnSCU system office. In addition to his experience as a higher education executive, John is an award-winning teacher at the college and university level. He was a faculty member at Normandale Community College, Augsburg College, the University of Minnesota, the University of St. Thomas, and Augustana College (South Dakota). John holds a bachelor's degree in English and English education from Augustana College, a master's degree in Anglo-Irish Literature from the University of Dublin (Trinity College), and a doctorate in English from the University of Minnesota.

The John E. Roueche International Leadership Award honors John's service to The University of Texas at Austin and recognizes his role as the founder of NISOD four decades ago. Dr. Roueche also held the Sid Richardson Regents Chair and served as Director of the Community College Leadership Program for over four decades.



Dr. Saundra Yancy McGuire

Metacognition: The Key to Equity and Excellence for All Students

Dr. Saundra Yancy McGuire is the Director Emerita of the Center for Academic Success and retired Assistant Vice Chancellor and Professor of Chemistry at Louisiana State



University. She has delivered keynote addresses or presented workshops on effective learning strategies at over 400 institutions in 46 states and nine countries. Prior to joining LSU, Dr. McGuire spent eleven years at Cornell University where she received the coveted Clark Distinguished Teaching Award. Dr. McGuire has also held faculty positions at Alabama A&M University and the University of Tennessee at Knoxville. Her best-selling book, *Teach Students How to Learn*, was co-published in association with NISOD and released by Stylus Publishing in 2015. The student version of this book, *Teach Yourself How to Learn*, was released in January 2018.

Dr. McGuire's most recent accolades include the 2017 American Chemical Society Award for Encouraging Disadvantaged Students to Pursue Careers in the Chemical Sciences and induction in 2017 into the LSU College of Science Hall of Distinction. She received the 2016 American Association for the Advancement of Science Lifetime Mentoring Award in recognition of her success at increasing the diversity of the Ph.D.-level workforce in the field of chemistry. In 2014, Dr. McGuire received the Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Organization for the Professional Advancement of Black Chemists and Chemical Engineers. She is an elected Fellow of the American Chemical Society, the American Association for the Advancement of Science, and the Council of Learning Assistance and Developmental Education Associations. The Presidential Award for Excellence in Science, Mathematics, and Engineering Mentoring was presented to her in a White House Oval office ceremony.

Dr. McGuire received her B.S. degree, *magna cum laude*, from Southern University in Baton Rouge, LA, her Master's from Cornell University, and her Ph.D. from the University of Tennessee at Knoxville, where she received the Chancellors Citation for Exceptional Professional Promise.



The Suanne Davis Roueche Distinguished Lecturer Award is named for Suanne Davis Roueche, who served as NISOD's director for nearly 20 years.

General Sessions

General Sessions provide an opportunity to learn from national keynote speakers who discuss topics of interest to all conference participants while setting the context and underlying tone for the conference.

Special Sessions

Special Sessions are open to all participants and feature invited speakers exploring topics specifically developed for a NISOD audience. Special Sessions are recorded and will be available to NISOD members for on-demand viewing after the conference.

Breakout Sessions

Breakout Sessions are 60 minutes in length, may include multiple presenters, and are intended for 25-75 participants. Presenters engage participants in interactive learning activities, provide handouts, and are prepared to respond to post-conference requests for more information.

Roundtable Discussions

Roundtable Discussions offer a more interactive venue for the exploration of key issues affecting community and technical college educators. These discussions accommodate up to ten participants and are limited to two discussion leaders. Multiple Roundtable Discussions are scheduled simultaneously. Roundtable Discussions are 60 minutes in length and are designed for exploratory topics and hands-on demonstrations that require small group interaction and more individual attention.



Excursions

LBJ Presidential Library, \$20

1 - 2:30 p.m.

Situated on The University of Texas at Austin campus, the LBJ Presidential Library houses 45 million pages of historical documents, 650,000 photos, and 5,000 hours of recordings from President Johnson's political career, including about 643 hours of his recorded telephone conversations. The iconic 10-story building was designed by award-winning architect Gordon Bunshaft and features a Great Hall with a stunning four-story, glass-encased view of the archives collection.

Buses begin loading at 1 p.m. at 5th and Neches (by Hilton Austin) and leave the LBJ Presidential Library at 2:30 p.m. Participants return to the Hilton in time to also participate in the San Antonio excursion.

San Antonio River Walk, \$50

3 - 9 p.m.

This self-guided excursion provides a tour of the San Antonio River Walk, a network of walkways along the banks of the San Antonio River. One story beneath and approximately five miles along the streets of downtown San Antonio, it is lined by numerous bars, shops, and restaurants. The River Walk is an important part of the city's urban fabric and a tourist attraction in its own right. Participants also have the opportunity to explore downtown San Antonio beyond the River Walk if they choose.

Buses begin loading at 3 p.m. at 5th and Neches (by Hilton Austin) and leave San Antonio to return to Austin at 9 p.m.

Engaged Academic Literacy for All: Reading Apprenticeship Room 406, 4th Floor

Have you ever worried whether your students are reading and comprehending the texts you assign? This seminar explores the Reading Apprenticeship framework, a model that helps teachers support students in becoming motivated, strategic, and critical readers, thinkers, and writers; to develop positive literacy identities; and to engage with challenging academic texts. Learn to view reading as a discipline-based, problemsolving activity; to analyze the impact of several metacognitive routines in order to begin planning classroom applications; and to approach students' reading, talking, and writing with a focus on equity and building on student strengths rather than focusing on deficits.

Reversing the lecture and homework elements and integrating high-engagement learning activities can completely change the dynamics of your class. During this interactive, hands-on workshop, explore the possibilities of the flipped classroom, engage with other participants, and leave with a personalized implementation plan and dozens of interactive engagement activities you can use immediately.

Respectful and Supportive Collegial Relationships in Higher Education: An Appreciative Inquiry *Room 412, 4th Floor*

Recent articles in the *Chronicle of Higher Education* and *Inside Higher Ed* have heightened concern about incivility and uncollegial behavior in higher education. Learn how to combat negative interactions with Appreciative Inquiry, a search for the best in people, their organizations, and the strengths-filled, opportunity-rich worlds they inhabit. At the conclusion of this seminar, participants will have learned the basics of conducting an Appreciative Inquiry; experienced a full Appreciative Inquiry process they can use on their campuses; discussed what respectful and supportive collegial relationships in higher education are; how these relationships can improve employee engagement, productivity, and student success; and created a set of collegiality guidelines suitable for higher education.

A Deep Dive Into Productive Persistence: Supporting Students' Academic Mindsets and Skills for Success Room 414, 4th Floor

Students believing that they are capable of learning, that they belong, and their use of effective strategies are all key to their academic success. During this seminar, participants learn about support efforts that increase students' productive persistence and can be integrated into courses through "starting-strong" and "staying-strong" activities. Participants reflect on common classroom experiences using a shared framework and adapt practical routines that promote and sustain academic mindsets in their classrooms. Gain hands-on experience with evidence-based interventions designed to create and maintain a classroom culture that supports students' productive persistence.

Emotional Intelligence, Self-Efficacy, and the Growth Mindset

Room 415A, 4th Floor

We each have a profound impact upon the emotional state of people with whom we engage in our classrooms and professional areas. Whether interacting with groups or individuals, the neuroscience is clear: the affective domain (the area of the brain dedicated to how people learn) powerfully impacts student cognition, persistence, motivation, and performance. During this multidimensional, highlyinteractive, experiential, and fun presentation, participants explore ways to promote positive, enthusiastic, and engaged collaboration among students. They also experience how to generate student collaboration in a manner that maximizes motivation, a sense of inclusion, and equity within their learning environments.
